In the twenties, scientists defined seven things guaranteed to raise a laugh - a funny story, tickling, a triumph, a surprise, an incongruous situation, a sense of well being, and to cover up for shyness or conceal thoughts. Think back to the last party you've attended. Here's betting you laughed because of all seven, especially the last.

Then there are derisive sniggers, tension-busting chortles, chuckles for acceptance, giggles to mask embarrassment. To survive, humans need a whole repertoire of laughs. Scientists believe that originally laughter was a defence mechanism to take the fear out of dangerous situations. Today we laugh under strict terms; almost never interrupting someone, not often at ourselves, hardly ever on our own, and with, great difficulty on demand, although the laughter clubs have managed to go Ho-Ho-Ho into the dawn.

Sadly, as we grow older, we become more restrained. At the age of 6 we laugh 300 times a day, but as adults it's down to 47, with the glum, managing just 6. Laughter gets the blood flowing in the upper torso, shoulder, arms, abdomen, diaphragm, and even the legs. 100 to 200 laughs are equal to 10 minutes of logging or rowing.

The benefits of this delightful workout go beyond the ten minutes. After a genuine belly laugh the muscles relax, blood pressure drops, circulation improves, digestion is aided. The benefits last for almost a day. The inner glow you feel is due to the release of endorphins, the body's painkillers. Norman Cousins, author of 'The Anatomy of an Illness' tells how he cured himself of a debilitating illness with liberal doses of vitamin C and laughter.

Laughter can fight diseases. It lowers levels of the stress hormone cortisol, which slows down immunity heightens activity of lymphocytes - the body's natural killer cells, and antibodies such as ACTH, immunoglobulin, and dopamine.

US hospitals are beginning to take note of these feelings and adding humour to patient's prescription with the hope of spreading healing. A New York hospital has a Clown Care Unit, and in Chicago, kids sample whacky wares from a mobile Humour Cart that's shaped like a huge house with a foot sticking out of the chimney, and supply everything from silly strings to plastic vomit to tease the nurse. You can see this working on the screen in the movie Patch Adams with Robin Williams as the 'Laughter' doctor.

A nutrient-rich diet is essential to make nails healthy. Biotin is an essential vitamin which is necessary for healthy growth of the nails. This in turn results in nails which are very thick. You may also get white nails instead of the usual light pink colour.

Similarly, another nutrient, silica is essential for the structural formation of nails and is part of the collagen production process. A deficiency of this can lead to thin and brittle nails. Zinc is another mineral which is very essential for both skin and hair and many people who suffer from hair fall due to its deficiencies frequently have a good response with zinc supplementation. Folic acid is not only necessary for blood formation but is an essential ingredient for nail development. Vitamin C is important for the structural development of the nails, iron which is important for the structural development of the nails and for haem (blood formation) is equally important for a healthy nail bed. A deficiency of iron leads to spoon shaped nails. Manganese is also important for good nails.

Some pathologies of the nails include a horizontal line in the nails, which correspond the periods of severe nutrition problems or a disease leading to malnutrition. Pitted nails also occur in many severe diseases. Many respiratory diseases lead to low oxygen levels in the blood which leads to malformation and yellowish colour of the nails.

The yellow colour can happen due to discolouration owing to nail polish pigments diffusing into the nail (nails incidentally are porous and can absorb surface agents).

Foods which are essential for healthy nails are:

- Raw salads for enzymes, vitamin C and B.
- Lightly steamed / sauteed vegetables.
- Proteins like soya, fish, paneer and proteins-carbs like dais will also do.
- Primrose oil, nuts and oil seeds like linseed, flaxseed, walnuts, almonds, Calcium sources like dark green leafy vegetables and dairy products.

Besides, some basic nail care techniques should be followed. Wearing gloves while using strong detergents, not using your nails as a tool to open cans, weekly oil treatment to the nails and not cutting the cuticle too short will help you grow healthy nails.

Getting rid of the veil, Naseema braved the violence, learnt the art of reading and writing and started working as a social volunteer. “I decided that instead of getting killed by my husband I should die for some social cause,” Naseema recalled. After a struggle of 25 years, Naseema, now 45, working as a social activist, is supporting her family along with her husband, who has mellowed down.

Her struggle inspired many Muslim women of the area to come forward for better education and fight for their rights.
